IMPACT ON STUDENTS, FACULTY, COMMUNITY:

Project can/will have a lasting impact through concrete activities and programs that serve students, faculty, and/or community partners. (1-10 points)

Proposal clearly outlines an existing need or gap in research related to a local/global issue.

Proposal describes research, education, community engagement and/or service activities to address the stated need and to benefit stakeholders / the community.

Proposal includes clear and achievable outcomes for students/faculty/community partners. Results must be measurable.

The proposal includes a plan for measuring or documenting the achievement of project objectives.

Project has potential to move the needle on an important issue, to grow, be replicated, attract new partners, achieve scale, and/or receive recognition.

Examples:

Lasting student programs that engage students in local/global communities and that can be shared or duplicated across universities in Atlanta

Community projects focused on a local/global issue that would continue across institutions and beyond AGREC grant funding

Development of a shared database / video collection / or other electronic resource

Published research

Creation of training materials in multiple languages

Train the trainer modules / materials
