AGREC Supports Native Science Curriculum Development for Dual-Language Instruction

AGREC is proudly supporting eight "global at home" collaborative projects this academic year. Each month's newsletter will highlight the incredible work of one project. This month's newsletter features the project, "Bringing Native Science into Atlanta's K-12 Dual Language Immersion: Digital Curriculum Development and Adaptation in an APS Classroom." Dual language immersion (DLI) education, where students learn half the day in a target language and half the day in English, offers the promise of equitable education in U.S. public education and is growing exponentially, nationally and in Atlanta. As DLI has grown, so has the need for high-quality DLI teaching materials and resources in all subjects and all grade levels, particularly STEM materials for upper elementary and middle school classrooms. To help meet this critical need, Co-Pls, Dr. G. Sue Kasun, Associate Professor of Middle and Secondary Education at Georgia State University (GSU), and Dr. James Gambrell, Associate Professor of Education at Kennesaw State University (KSU), are working closely with two Intercultural Veracruz University faculty in the development of a digital Native Science curriculum with exemplar instructional materials and pilot data from one 5th grade Atlanta Public Schools classroom. Data from the first two months of the project include evidence of student satisfaction and requests to continue the project. In addition. Latinx students have reported a stronger sense of inclusion in the curriculum by seeing indigenous (Nahua and Totonaco) science practices in films made for the project.

The seed funding from AGREC is laying the groundwork for a larger project which uses traditional ecological knowledge to address the national critical need for highly-engaging science curriculum in dual language immersion instruction. Kasun has recently submitted a \$2 million proposal to the National Science Foundation to pilot this work in Atlanta Public Schools and San Antonio Public Schools. In the short term, this exciting Native Science DLI project will deliver no-cost resources for dual language immersion educators. (copy approved by Co-Pls)

Foreign Language and Area Studies (FLAS) Fellowships, Academic Year 2022-23



The 2022-23 Academic Year FLAS Application is coming soon. FLAS Fellowships assist undergraduate and graduate students in achieving competency in selected foreign languages in combination with international and area studies coursework. FLAS Fellowships are available for the less commonly taught languages of Arabic, Chinese, Hebrew, Hindi, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Persian/Farsi,

Portuguese, Russian, and Swahili. Funding for French, German, and Spanish languages may be available for GRADUATE students at an advanced level. French, German and Spanish are NOT eligible languages for UNDERGRADUATE students. FLAS fellowships can be used to study abroad or on campus.

Why is studying foreign languages important to you?

Learning a foreign language is important for me because my research interest is in Latin American Politics, and I find that knowing how to read Spanish is really helpful for my research. Hence, I realized that learning Portuguese would also benefit my research as it is the second most used language in Latin America.

Why Portuguese?

Learning Portuguese is essential for my research interests, but it is also a language I have been exposed to my whole life. My aunt was born in Brazil, and Portuguese is her first language, as it is for my three cousins. This early exposure to Portuguese sparked my interest in intensively studying the language, and learning about Brazilian culture, politics, and history has also become important to me.

What are your career plans?

I plan on working in the nonprofit sector once I graduate with my master's degree. I hope that learning Portuguese will allow me to be of help to the Portuguese-speaking community in Atlanta.

What kind of impact has the FLAS fellowship had on you?

Without the FLAS Fellowship, pursuing a master's degree would not be possible. I have had the amazing opportunity to achieve a master's degree and simultaneously become fluent in a foreign language that I have always wanted to learn. The FLAS Fellowship has made it easy for me to study Portuguese. In addition, I have had the opportunity to meet other students in Atlanta who are passionate about the language and enjoy learning about Brazil.

In addition to your FLAS fellowship, have you engaged in other programs offered through the Atlanta Global Studies Center?

The Atlanta Global Studies Center hosts some of the most exciting speakers. I have enjoyed attending the discussion with Brazil's Ambassador, Nestor Forster. In addition, I enjoyed representing FLAS fellows at the Study Abroad Fair, where students received information about the Summer FLAS Program.

What advice would you like to give to students interested in applying for a FLAS Fellowship?

My advice is that you should not be intimidated by the application process. There are many benefits to learning a foreign language. If you are interested in learning a specific language that qualifies for the FLAS fellowship, you should take advantage of the opportunity and apply. You have absolutely nothing to lose, but you have a lot to gain from the FLAS fellowship. Learning a foreign language is always a benefit for your career goals, and you will be so proud of yourself for all of the progress you have made once you earn your degree.

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Faculty Spotlight: Mathias Guerreiro-Aires



Mathias Guerreiro-Aires is a Lecturer of French in the Department of World Languages and Cultures at Georgia State University. He currently serves as the French for International Business Coordinator, French Lower Division Coordinator, and French Exchange Programs Supervisor. After working for several years in the airline industry in France and the United States, Professor Guerreiro-Aires joined GSU in 2016 and has taught elementary, intermediate, and advanced French courses.

Tell us about the French for International Business program and the courses you teach.

The French for International Business program is an interdisciplinary concentration within the B.A. in French. Students familiarize themselves with the

business world in various French-speaking countries. In this program, we believe in practical learning and task-based pedagogy. This means that students acquire transferable skills by engaging in relevant language tasks and projects such as preparing for job interviews and developing concepts for business ventures in the French-speaking country of their choice. Criticality and cross-cultural competence are emphasized, allowing students to think critically on various issues related to international business and international law. In sum, students acquire the critical thinking and global skills needed to communicate, thrive, and succeed in competitive and international careers. We feature prominent guest speakers who introduce our students to job and career opportunities available to them locally, nationally, and internationally. Students in the program have completed internships that count toward their degree and volunteered during major business events such as the Crystal Peach Awards Gala, the most prestigious Francophone business event in Georgia. I teach intermediate and advanced French courses, more specifically, courses on French for International Business and, this semester, a newly developed course on Francophone Perspectives on Human Rights, Power, and Resistance.

Why do you believe that students should study foreign languages, particularly French?

Studying another language enables students to broaden their world, gain valuable experience, acquire intercultural competence, and grow as individuals. Entering today's workforce with proficiency in a language and cultural competence increases professional opportunities significantly. Aside from being able to communicate with more people, students become more accepting, tolerant, and understanding. French is spoken on all continents and is the second most learned language in the world after English. French is also one of the fastest growing languages, especially in western Africa where it is a lingua franca. Because the African population is growing rapidly, some experts predict that the number of French speakers worldwide could reach 700 million by 2050. Africa offers multiple business and career opportunities through its emerging economies, and many non-governmental organizations recruit French speakers seeking career opportunities in

Tell us about your current research or teaching projects.

My current research interests include intercultural competence in language education, critical language pedagogy, teaching language for social justice, and human rights. I want to find ways to "democratize" the French language curriculum and make it more inclusive, accessible, and diverse. I strongly believe that language courses should include less-represented French-speaking communities and reflect the student population we teach. The curriculum should match students' interests, values, and challenges, and instruction should respect and embrace students' identities. My research also focuses on French for international business. I want to find strategies to facilitate the transition between college and career by creating more internship opportunities for students in the French for International Business program.

As home to the largest number of French speakers in the world, Africa's role in the growth of French as a global language is unquestionable. In your opinion, how should French instruction include aspects of culture and language from Francophone Africa?

I include aspects of African cultures as well as issues that French-speaking African countries and communities currently face in most of my classes. I have found that GSU students are particularly interested in these issues. In my Francophone Perspectives on Human Rights, Power, and Resistance course, we discuss ethnic conflicts in Mali, issues related to food and water access in Chad, and women's rights in the DRC. This diversified curriculum helps students realize that there is a whole Francophone world on the African continent and that France is not the only French-speaking country to discover. I strongly believe that language programs should be more inclusive and representative of the various French-speaking communities around the world.

You've been involved in a number of AGSC programs, including serving on the FLAS Fellowship review committee and participating in the Global Career Series. Could you say a few words about why faculty and students should get involved with AGSC?

The FLAS Fellowship is a wonderful initiative that enables many students, often from underrepresented and underserved communities, to fund their studies abroad and study of languages. I supervise six French exchange programs at GSU, and I can say that studying abroad is the best way to acquire the language and learn from its native speakers. Yet, it can be expensive, so I can't emphasize enough how great of an opportunity the FLAS Fellowship is. The Global Career Series is a great opportunity for students and faculty to meet multilingual and multicultural professionals who make major contributions to various fields such as global health and education. Aside from gaining valuable knowledge, students make many connections and familiarize themselves with the multiple professional opportunities that await them after graduation. In sum, AGSC is a great avenue for students to prepare not only for competitive and international careers, but also for the globalized world in which we live.







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
